

<u>Travel and Tourism</u> Component 3 – Influence on Global Travel & Tourism Essential Content C



How does this unit link to prior learning?

In this exam component you will build on the knowledge, understanding and practices acquired and developed in Components 1 and 2. Using your knowledge from component 1 of the major components of the travel Industry in the UK and applying this knowledge and understanding to the global travel and tourism market. You will apply the knowledge built of customer needs in component 2 to understand how governments manage and develop tourism to meet the demands of both the customers and the local communities.

What will you be learning about?

You will develop and understanding of how global destinations change over time and that tourism may be managed and developed differently, depending on whether the destination is recently emerging or an established, mature destination. You will learn about the role of different organisations involved in managing and developing tourism, and the importance of partnership working. Learners will understand how these partnerships work together to promote destinations, attract investment, manage destinations and develop new tourism products and services.

The key focus of this unit of work is to how global travel and tourism destination change and manage and develop their tourism offer depending on the needs and demands at that time. You will cover the following key areas

Homework guidance:
